5 (An Ordinance Enacting Chapter 2.10.190 Restricting the Police Department’s Receipt or  
6 Acquisition of Certain Military Surplus Property)  
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8 WHEREAS, Salt Lake City Corporation is prioritizing policy and ordinance  
9 reforms so that the City will be as progressive and safe in its policing of all people within  
10 its jurisdiction as possible; and

11 WHEREAS, the City Council believes that prohibiting the receipt or acquisition  
12 of surplus military equipment is one of the first steps necessary to create a safer city for  
13 all people in Salt Lake City and to ensure that the Salt Lake City Police Department is a  
14 trusted partner to all people.

15 NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah:

16 SECTION 1. Chapter 2.10.190 of the Salt Lake City Code shall be, and hereby is,  
17 enacted to read as follows.

18 (1) The police department may not use City funds to receive or acquire the following  
19 property from any military equipment surplus program, whether state, federal, municipal,  
20 or private:

- 21 (a) drones that are armored, weaponized, or both;
- 22 (b) aircraft that are combat configured or combat coded;
- 23 (c) grenades or similar explosives and grenade launchers;
- 24 (d) military grade weapons, including silencers; or
- 25 (e) militarized armored vehicles.

26 (2) If the police department desires to purchase or acquire property from a military  
27 equipment surplus program or to seek a grant that will be matched by the federal

28 government to purchase property from the military equipment surplus program, the police  
29 department must seek a budget amendment from the City Council and such budget  
30 amendment will, in writing, explain the need for the surplus military property and explain  
31 the specific proposed uses for such property.

32 (3) If the police department desires to accept, as a donation, property from a military  
33 equipment surplus program, the police department must notify the City's director of  
34 finance, the Mayor's Office, and the City Council, in writing, of the police department's  
35 intent to receive the donation and explain, in writing, the need for the surplus military  
36 property and explain the specific proposed uses for such property.

37 (3) The City Council will hold at least one public hearing on all requests from the  
38 police department to acquire, accept, purchase, or receive property from a military  
39 equipment surplus program.

40 (a) At the conclusion of the public hearing, and prior to the police department's  
41 acceptance of any donation of military surplus equipment, the Council may adopt a  
42 resolution either (i) identifying the public purpose for the City's acceptance of the  
43 military surplus equipment and recommending the acceptance, or (ii) indicating that the  
44 Council has not identified a public purpose for the City's acceptance of the military  
45 surplus equipment, and recommending that the City not accept the military surplus  
46 equipment.

47 (b) If the police department accepts the donation of military surplus equipment after  
48 the Council recommends against it, the police department must, identify the public  
49 purpose and specific use for the equipment in any donation agreement with the donor.

50 (4) By the end of each fiscal year, the police department will make an initial written

51 report to City Council of its current inventory of any of the items specified above, and an  
52 annual report thereafter. The initial and annual report shall, in writing, explain the need  
53 for the military surplus property, the specific uses of such property, and whether any City  
54 funds are or will be used to maintain such property.

55 SECTION 4. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon  
56 publication.
